Bragging about "Big V" Vanessa Hayden...

... ranked third all-time in SEC history for blocked shots. Hayden swatted 357 shots in 107 games. With seven swats at Temple on January 2, she passed Georgia's Katrina McClain who collected 290 blocks in 125 games. Vanderbilt's Angela Gorsica sits in second place with 368 blocks.

... scored 1,576 points during her career, ranking seventh place all-time in UF history.

... collected her 1,000th career rebound 18 seconds into the January 29 game against Alabama. Hayden had 1,105 rebounds, which ranks fifth all-time in UF history.

... became just the fifth Gator ever to record 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds, joining UF greats Quientella Bonner, Murriel Page, Tammy Jackson and DeLisha Milton.

... through the first 10 games this season Hayden scored 204 points, passing the 197 she totaled through the 18 she played last season.

... topped the 1,200-point plateau and 900-rebound mark versus UCF on December 20.

... has recorded 17 double-doubles this season and 50 in her career.

... has 14 20-point games this season and 23 in her career.

... has one 30-point game this season and three in her career.

Season Story Line

No one knew what to expect from the Florida women's basketball team when the 2003-04 season began. Sure, the Gators returned 11 of 13 letterwinners from the previous season. In fact, all five primary starters were back, including pre-season All-American **Vanessa Hayden**. However, the uncertainty rested with the character and competitive nature of those 11 Gators who were returning to the court with three newcomers. How would they respond from the previous season's disappointing 9-19 overall record and a 1-13 mark in the Southeastern Conference?

The answer: With resounding success!

Under second year head coach **Carolyn Peck**, Florida produced a 19-11 record resulting in the greatest one-season turnaround in the 30-year history of the program.

The Gators earned the No. 5 seed in the NCAA Championship and advanced to the second round for the sixth time in history. Florida overcame 16,000 deafening New Mexico fans in the first round win against the hosting Lobos.

Florida received the No. 4 seed in the SEC Tournament and a first round bye for the seventh time in program history after posting a 8-6 league record and finished tied for fourth in the conference standings - having been picked to finish eighth during the pre-season.

On February 2, the team earned its first top-25 ranking in the Associated Press national poll since the 2001-02 season. The Gators won six games versus nationally ranked teams, including their first on the road when the Gators were unranked themselves since Jan. 16, 1994. Florida swept a two-game series against Georgia for the first time since 1978-79, snapping the Bulldog's 23-game home winning streak that had been the second longest active win streak in the country.

All of this success came despite having played the third toughest schedule in

the country (as rated by the WBCA), having just 10 home games and opening the season on a seven-game road trip, while playing nine of the first 10 games away from Gainesville.

Coach Peck's Memories

"I'll remember winning the final game of our regular season at Auburn. I'll look at the NCAA brackets, that the University of Florida basketball got great respect in getting a No. 5 seed. I'll look back at coming back and playing in front of 18,000 people and winning our first game in the NCAA Tournament. I'll look back most of all at a team that did not get defeated by a 9-19 season (in 2002-03). They became winners."

This Year vs. Ranked Teams

UF was 6-5 versus opponents ranked in either poll at the time of the game. The Gators were 5-5 against teams ranked in the top-25 of the ESPN Coaches' Poll (Vanderbilt was not ranked for Feb. 1 game) and 5-5 versus AP-ranked teams (Vanderbilt was not ranked for the Jan. 11 game). The Gators posted upset wins over Georgia twice, UC Santa Barbara and Vanderbilt twice (ranked only in one both in each meeting), with two losses coming to each LSU and Baylor and one to Tennessee.

Returning to the Dance Floor

The Gators made their 10th overall appearance in the NCAA Championship, and their first since the 2002 season.

All 10 of Florida's trips to the NCAA Championship have come within the last 13 years, making a run to the 2000 WNIT championship game while missing both events in 2003.

Gator Watch

Senior All-American **Vanessa Hayden** clearly was the focus of the 2003-04 Gator squad. At 6-foot-4, she was one of the most imposing figures in the women's

basketball game and received national attention for her play, being added mid-season to both the John Wooden Award and the State Farm Wade Trophy Award. She was a finalist for the Kodak/WBCA All-America Team. Hayden was recognized by the SEC coaches as the league's 2004 Defensive Player of the Year.

Hayden performed every bit like the All-American that she was, averaging 19.0 points and 10.6 rebounds. She led the SEC in rebounding, double-doubles (17) and blocked shots (107), and ranked third in scoring. Nationally, Hayden ranked No. 7 in blocks, No. 15 in rebounding, No. 29 in scoring and No. 41 in field goal percentage.

Smart Senior Swatter

Vanessa Hayden was named the 2004 SEC Defensive Player of the Year in part because of her uncanny ability to block shots - along with her 84-inch wing span! She is the third greatest shot blocker in SEC history, rejecting 357 during her career.

While she did not average as many blocks per game as she did during her record-setting sophomore season when she averaged 4.3 rejections, Hayden fouled out of just one game during her junior and senior years. She didn't foul out during her junior year and wasn't whistled for her fifth personal until her final collegiate game, March 22, 2004.

Other Gators to Watch

Tashia Morehead had an immediate impact on the Gators success during her first year in Gainesville. She started every game and contributed 12.0 points and 5.7 rebounds, while sinking a team-high 38 three-pointers (32.8 percent).

She had her first breakout performance in UF's stunning upset win at No. 11/9 Georgia and was solid ever since, even being recognized as the SEC Player of the Week on Feb. 2 after leading UF to wins over Alabama and at Vanderbilt. In her NCAA debut, Morehead scored all 16 of her points in the first half while grabbing a

game-high 11 rebounds.

Bernice Mosby, who led UF in scoring last year, came off the bench in every game to average 13.4 points and 6.7 rebounds, both ranking second on the team, while shooting a team-high 40.3 percent (27-67) from the three-point line. Mosby, who was recognized as the SEC Sixth Woman of the Year, was UF's leading scorer in both NCAA Championship games.

Danielle Santos stepped up as the team's defensive stopper, usually drawing the top offensive threats, while collecting a team-high 53 steals. Offensively, she contributed 9.1 points and 3.6 rebounds and a team-best 3.3 assists per game.

Upsetting Regular Season Finish

The Gators ended the regular season snapping a four-game slide with a 69-59 upset victory over No. 19/15 Georgia (Feb. 26) and followed that up with an impressive 71-60 win on the road at No. 18/20 Auburn on Sunday, Feb. 29.

The victory over the Tigers marked the Gator's sixth upset over a nationally ranked team this season. All of those wins have come while UF has been unranked. It is the second-most upset victories in one season by the Gators. The 1996-97 team posted a school-record seven upsets, however, only two of those wins came when UF was unranked itself.

Terrific Turnaround

The Gators won 10 more games than they did last season, when the team posted a 9-19 record. It is the biggest improvement in UF history. The 1982-83 team posted an 11-16 record that was followed by a 19-9 record the next season.

Tested & Tough

UF's final six-game stretch prior to the start of the NCAA Championship featured five teams ranked among the nation's top-20. Arkansas was the lone non-ranked team on UF's schedule during that span.

Overall, UF's schedule was rated as the third toughest in the nation (by the WBCA/Summerville ratings).

Hayden Swats 100th

With her first of three blocks against New Mexico in the first round of the NCAA Championship, **Vanessa Hayden** swatted her 100th of the season and the 350th of her career. It was just the third time in UF history that a Gator blocked at least 100 shots in a season. Hayden rejected a school-record 126 during the 2002 campaign, while Quientella Bonner blocked 104 in 1981.

Movin' on Up

The Gators were picked during the preseason by the SEC media to finish in eighth place in the conference standings. The team exceed expectations by finishing tied for fourth in the final standings.

Explanation of Formula: The most improved formula includes the improvement in losses as well as the victories. For example, Florida improved its record from 9-19 in 2002-03 to 19-11 in 2003-04. To get the improvement you take the difference in victories factor (up 10) plus the difference in losses factor (down 8). Then add the two factors together (plus 18) and divide by two. That means the improvement from last year to this year for Florida was 9.

Ranked Teams on Hostile Courts

Since the 1990-91 season, UF is 14-40 on the road (not including neutral site courts) versus nationally ranked teams, including a 3-3 record this year. Most recently, the team topped No. 18 Auburn 71-60 on Feb. 29 in Auburn, Ala.

Prior to the Gators' 83-73 upset over No. 11/9 Georgia on January 18, the last time UF defeated a nationally ranked opponent on the road when the Gators were unranked themselves was back on Jan. 16, 1994, when UF stunned No. 10 Alabama 80-75.

The Gators also posted a 92-83 win over No. 24 Vanderbilt on Feb. 1 in Nashville.

Return to the Top-25

The Gators cracked the top-25 of the Associated Press poll on February 2, coming in at the No. 24 position. It marked the team's first appearance in the national poll since being tied-for No. 24 in the final AP listing of the 2001-02 season.

The Gators began receiving 16 votes in the December 15 Associated Press national poll after compiling a 6-2 record that included a convincing 75-49 victory over No. 15 UC Santa Barbara. It was the first time UF received votes in the AP poll since Dec. 9, 2002, when the Gators earned three votes.

Elite Company

During the first 18 seconds of UF's game against Alabama on January 29, **Vanessa Hayden** became the only the fifth Gator to collect 1,000 career points and rebounds. She joined an elite group of former UF standouts who also topped both plateaus: Quientella Bonner, Murriel Page, Tammy Jackson and DeLisha Milton.

Streaks Against Ranked Teams

UF was 6-5 this season versus nationally ranked opponents, first defeating No. 15/17 UC Santa Barbara, 75-49. That upset victory snapped a 13-game losing streak versus ranked foes that dated back to the 2001-02 season when the 18th-ranked UF topped 17th-ranked Georgia 73-64 on Jan. 27, 2002.

The win over UCSB was the Gator's first victory over a ranked opponent when they were unranked since Dec. 3, 2000, when unranked UF stunned 11th-ranked Penn State, 92-79.

UF then topped 22nd-ranked (Coaches Poll) Vanderbilt, 67-61. The Commodores had been ranked in the AP poll, but had fallen out the week of the game. However the Commodores were ranked No. 24 in the AP poll during the Feb. 1 meeting, when the Gators won 92-83 in Nashville.

On January 18, the Gators posted a stunning 83-73 win over No. 11/9 Georgia in Athens. That win ended UF's SEC road losing streak at 11 games, a run that dated back to the 2001-02 season. The victory also marked UF's first over Georgia in Athens since February 8, 1995 and was the Gators first win over a nationally ranked opponent on the road when the Gators were unranked themselves since stunning No. 10 Alabama back on Jan. 16, 1994.

Sunshine Streak Stopped

UF's heartbreaking 80-75 loss to Miami on December 12 in Coral Gables not only ended the Gators eight-game win streak versus the Hurricanes, it halted the team's 45-game run against its Sunshine State rivals.

UF played five different teams from the state of Florida this season - all on the road: South Florida (Dec. 2, W 70-55), Florida State (Dec. 6, W 74-60), Miami (Dec. 12, L 80-75), BCC (Dec. 19, W 86-50) and UCF (Dec. 20, W 79-48).

Prior to the loss to Miami, **Florida Atlantic** was the last team from the Sunshine State to defeat the Gators, claiming the 84-63 win on Feb. 16, 1993. FAU's **Yolanda Griffith**, the No. 1 overall selection in the 1997 ABL draft and current member of the WNBA's Sacramento Monarchs, contributed 38 points and 15 rebounds in the winning effort.

Florida Gators

There were a total of 471 Gator student-athletes on 2003-04 rosters and 289 of them are natives of the Sunshine State, including nine members of the women's basketball team.

Looking Good!

According to a ranking by Super-Hair.Net released on February 17, Carolyn Peck ranks No. 7 nationally for having the best hair in the country (of all women). They Still Got Game!

Head coach **Carolyn Peck** led her coaching team to victory against campus champion "Team Shoot" in the inaugural Carolyn P Three-on-Three Tournament held Nov. 13.

Peck's squad, which consisted of assistant coaches **Charlene "CT" Thomas-Swinson** and **Kerry Cremeans**, as well as her assistant **Melissa Maines** and UF head women's golf coach **Jill Briles-Hinton**, used their superior height advantage to a 2-games-to-

Gator Bytes...

UF held a 9-19 record through the 28 games the team played last year.

The Gators did not win their ninth game of last season until February 27, defeating Ole Miss 78-64 for their first and only SEC victory of the year.

Prior to this season, the biggest improvement in UF history from one year to the next was an eight-game turn-around. The 1982-83 team posted an 11-16 record that was followed by a 19-9 record the next season.

UF played its first seven games of the 2003-04 season on the road, while opening with nine of its first 10 away from Gainesville.

The season-opening seven-game road trip was tied for the longest season-opening road stretch in program history. The 1988-89 squad also began its season playing its first seven away from Gainesville, posting a 4-3 record during that span.

In all, UF played just 10 home games this season and 17 contests on the road, not including any games at the SEC Tournament.

UF's longest home stretch of games this season was just two... yes, two! And it occurred three times.

0 win in the inaugural event versus undergraduate students.

The coaches' team won after posting a 15-9 victory in game one, before clinching a 15-6 decision to seal the win. Tournament rules award one point for each two-point field goal and two points for every 3-pointer. The team that wins two of three games - decided by the first to reach 15 points and leading by two - claims the victory.
